Students: I had two goals in mind for my students: 1) a shared writing activity with some note taking and 2) introduce the five Happiness topics. I listed a topic, students took notes, shared their thoughts, and we co-authored a sentence to summarize the topic.

Parents: We take seriously the importance of Safe, Loved and Learning. I expect my class to learn about and demonstrate these character traits. Doing so will help create a more successful classroom and future citizens. Our topics include \* Social Connections, \* Acts of Kindness, \*Gratefulness, \* Mindfulness of our emotions, and \* Being compassionate with ourselves.

It struck me that the teacher had obviously done a good job practicing class procedures with students, but even moreso, the interaction between the two students and the smile on the boy's face after his partner had seemed to whisper a secret to him.

I couldn't help myself. I had to know what she had said to him. I walked around class reinforcing students' hard work and stopped by the girl's desk. I bent down and asked her quietly what she had told her friend. She grinned at me and said, "He sometimes forgets his password for the chromebook. I just reminded him that he has it written down on a sticky note in the box in his desk. Mrs. G likes it when a whole table gets started without help." I told her that she was a good friend and thanked her for sharing it with me. *Random acts of kindness* like this are not uncommon at GVA. In fact, they happen every day in every classroom and all over campus. Sometimes you have to be looking for just that sort of thing to notice it. I'm lucky that I was paying attention that day.
